and defend us from every evil. Amen.

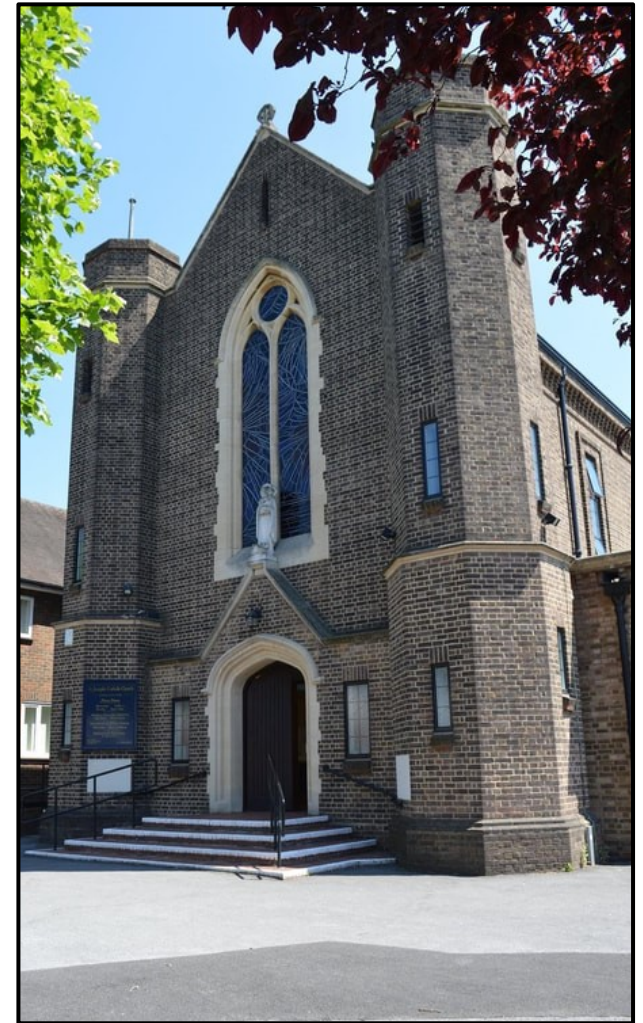

## CENTENARY APPEAL

**ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO** a new Catholic parish was established in Upminster dedicated to St Joseph. The generosity of past parishioners enabled the building of the first church on Sunnyside Gardens, and the new church we now worship in. It seems fitting to mark our Centenary by leaving a tangible legacy for the future: a means of giving thanks for the past whilst also increasing the prominence of our building as a sign of God's presence among us. I propose two specific projects, to be funded by a Centenary Appeal, which you can read about in this leaflet.

In addition to something for our church building, I hope we can do something to strengthen our sense of belonging to a worldwide community of faith, in which we support one another in material ways as well as in prayer. It would be good if to make a significant donation to Brentwood's twin Diocese of Dundee in South Africa.

Finally, this is a beginning, not an end. During this centenary year I hope each of us can have a clearer sense of our own calling within the mission of the church. I hope that as a *community* we can also have a clearer sense of how we can further our mission in Upminster, and what investment is needed to make that happen.

To enable us to move forward with the projects described in this leaflet, I hope that we can raise £15,000 over the next six months. If each family in our parish community was able to give £30, that would get us there. I know this will be too much for some in addition to your existing commitment to the parish, others will be able to give more, but please consider prayerfully what you can give.

## **A BELL TO ANNOUNCE THE GOOD NEWS**

Bells have long been associated with churches as an invitation to prayer, a call to worship, and as a means of proclaiming God's presence. That is part of the function of the Church: a sign of God's presence among his people. Our church does not have a bell, but we do have two turrets either side of the main entrance which seem tailor-made to house at least one modestly-sized bell. In the Catholic tradition, a bell is rung as the Angelus is recited: the prayer which begins with the Angel announcing to Mary the good news that she is to become the mother of the divine Saviour. It is a reminder of the Incarnation, God dwelling among us, that is not only prayed but traditionally rung morning, noon and evening. The other moment when a bell might be rung is at the consecration, the moment when Our Lord literally becomes present on the altar in the form of bread and wine. When the bell is heard at these moments it signifies to all who hear it that God is with us. It is an invitation to all who hear it to lift our hearts to God in prayer, joining with the whole community inside and outside the church building.

The bell is not going to be ringing constantly nor will it be rung at unsociable hours. It probably won't be very noticeable indoors either. But if the distant tolling of a bell captures our attention it should remind us of what is of greatest importance: God's desire that we should be one with him. It is truly a means of evangelizing: announcing the Gospel.



## **A PRAYER GARDEN FOR SCHOOL AND PARISH**

A narrow strip of grass between the church and the school playground is set aside as a prayer garden. It is a place where some former members of the school community are remembered. However it is not usable by the children of the school as there is a steep bank and it tends to get muddy when wet.

Our plan is to replace the grass with patio-style paving, with level access from the car park and steps to the playground. It will have a gate at either end so it can be safely used by the school during the school day and by the public at other times.

The prayer garden will be completed with a shrine of Our Lady, recalling places such as Lourdes and Fatima where Our Lady has appeared to children. The connection with Our Lady of Lourdes is especially significant as under this particular title she is honoured as patroness of our diocese.
