(2 Kings 4:8-11.14-16, Romans 6:3-4.8-11, Matthew 10:37-42)

This Sunday's gospel is not easy to hear. We are asked in very stark terms to prioritise Christ over those who are closest to us. Our instinctive response might be to protest: of course I love my parents, or my children, or my spouse, more than anything else. Or we might dismiss it as just another of those bible passages that don't really apply to us. Let us consider what Jesus is really saying to us. 'Nothing is more important than me.' It is a bold claim — a claim that only one who is truly God, maker and Lord of all things, could possibly make. Our initial response might prompt further reflection: do I see my faith as one of the many things that are part of my life and my identity, but not necessarily the most important? Perhaps I am not (yet) fully conscious of a relationship with Christ, which is deeper than any human relationship. If so, let us take comfort from the fact that none of us is quite there yet. Someone once said that a saint is a person whose life is all about one thing (i.e. Christ). We are called to become saints, but the key word is 'become', for we are all work's in progress.

We can see something of this in St Peter, whose feast we celebrated (along with St Paul) on Thursday. St Paul is known for his dramatic conversion. St Peter, on the other hand, seems to show us a more gradual, perhaps more recognisable path. His bravado at the last supper gives way to his denial of Christ, fearing for his own life. His embarrassment and shame makes it difficult for him to accept the reconciliation Christ offers on the shore of Galilee. When Our Lord asks 'do you love me?' he is burdened by his failure and expresses his frustration. Filled with the Holy Spirit he becomes a bold preacher of the gospel and takes on the mantle of shepherd. At the end of his life he initially flees Rome, where he is to be put to death, until he has a vision of Christ going to the city to be crucified again for him. Finally, with complete faith and trust and selfless love, he is willing to accept the consequences of being known as an apostle of Christ.

Let us return to those challenging words in the Gospel. Would we baulk at someone suggesting we should value the sun more than the people we love? Surely not: because we know that without the sun none of us would exist. We also know that there is no real conflict – recognising the central importance of the sun does not come at the expense of those close to us.

Our life is as dependent on Christ as it is on the sun – more so in fact, because the sun itself is dependent on him. Christ is our sun – the true centre of our being. We are made for loving communion with others. Christ is not telling us not to love parents

or children, or to love them with anything less than total, generous, unselfish love. Christ wants us to love them more than we do already. But he also identifies himself as the only one who can claim the central place in our lives. If we put anything else at the centre then our lives will be off-balance. With Christ at the centre, everything and everyone else – and that includes all our family relationships – will be allowed to assume their own proper significance in our lives, not in competition with Christ but as a manifestation of his greatness and a means of our true flourishing.

Christ speaks both of sacrifice and reward. Our human experience tells us that if we really love another person, then we are ready to make sacrifices for them. But love brings its own reward – there is no greater joy than giving and receiving love. The thing that makes sacrifice more difficult – our self-centredness – becomes less and less of an issue the more truly Christ-centred we become. Following Christ may – surely will – entail certain sacrifices. Faithfulness to Christ means choosing his way rather than our own. We trust that his will is for our good, but we are constantly pulled in other directions by things which seem more immediately appealing to us. The call of the gospel may lead to quite significant demands and radical changes to our lives, depending on our particular circumstances and the particular path our Lord wishes us to follow. But it is in living for Christ, not for ourselves, that we become fully alive. However attractive a life centred on 'me' might appear, it is nothing compared to a life centred on him.

As you will see in the announcement of moves below, the makeup of the clergy in our Upminster/Hornchurch parish partnership will be somewhat different in September (I'm not going anywhere though!). I have assured Fr Martin and Fr Britto of our good wishes, and offered my prayers and support to Fr Mark and Fr Linu. Let us also keep the people of our neighbouring parishes in our prayers at this time of transition for them.
