(Wisdom 12:13.16-19, Romans 8:26-27, Matthew 13:24-43)

This Sunday's gospel gives us part of an answer to why evil exists in the world. God permits it for now, even though as a good and loving father the last thing he wants us for his children to suffer in any way, because simply to uproot it from the world would inhibit our own freedom to grow to maturity.

In the parable the weeds have been planted by an enemy. Jesus teaches very clearly that evil is not from God but is the work of one who has turned against him wants us to join him in this rebellion – even though he knows he cannot possibly prevail against God, he takes a grim satisfaction in taking as many souls as possible with him. This enemy has a name: the devil – and, like Jesus and also like Pope Francis we should not be afraid of naming him.

What makes something a weed is the fact that it is growing in the wrong place, out of control, and preventing the good plants from flourishing. And that is true of evil as well - it is not some rival force or energy in the universe, created by one who is equal to God. It is simply the effect of God's creatures turning away from him who is the source of all good. The devil is one of those creatures – he is not God's equal, and his ultimate defeat is already certain.

The devil's greatest trick is to make evil appear attractive. It's not always easy, especially for an inexperienced gardener such as myself, to tell the weeds and the good plants apart. Indeed, some of the weeds can be quite attractive, and its only when they rapidly overwhelm everything else that the problem becomes apparent. How true that is in our world today. We all recoil from evil in its most unpleasant manifestations. But the most pernicious weeds are those which appear attractive and appeal to our most instinctive desire, which is to be happy. But by drawing us away from life in God, they prevent us attaining true happiness.

If these weeds are so harmful to his creation, why does God not simply come and sweep them away? Because, with the wisdom of the farmer in the parable, he knows that when weeds are well established they cannot be uprooted without harming the crop. In other words, we can only grow and flourish if we are allowed freedom, including the freedom to turn away from him. But we also know that one day, when the time is right the weeds will be uprooted and the good crop harvested. Then he will establish a new heaven and new earth where his name is always held holy and all people rejoice to embrace his perfect will.

For the other thing this parable makes clear is that our present existence is only temporary. Our life on earth is a period of growth – but we live for the harvest, when the end for which we were created, namely eternal union with God, is realised. For now we must trust in the Lord, who sustains and rules all that he has made with loving care and infinite wisdom, rather than despair in the reality of human sinfulness. And knowing how divided we are even in our own hearts, we must ask him for the grace of true repentance, that we may sincerely desire his forgiveness for the ways in which we have allowed weeds to take root within us, and ask him in his loving mercy to tend the garden of our soul so that the good crop may flourish in us – for the longer we leave it, the harder the task of weeding becomes.

This week I will be in Lourdes with the diocese, a place which emphasises God's love for each individual person, and his desire to bring all people into his healing embrace. The church will be open for prayer each morning but (apart from Monday) there won't be weekday Mass - I encourage those who are accustomed to attending Mass during the week to attend Mass in a neighbouring parish on these days. The Mass is truly the summit and source of our faith: the moment when Christ's victory over the evil one is brought into our present, and his self-sacrifice – overturning the self-serving nature of sin – is represented to the Father. I will pray for your intentions as I concelebrate Mass with the Bishop each day in Lourdes.
