# PARISH NEWSLETTER

## 8TH / 9TH JULY 2023 FOURTEENTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR (A) - Mass Book Pg 41

(2 Kings 4:8-11.14-16, Romans 6:3-4,8-11, Matthew 10:37-42)

In his book A Brief History of Time, Stephen Hawkings describes how at the end of a public lecture on astronomy given by a well-known scientist a little old lady stood up at the back and said 'What you have told us is rubbish. The world is really a flat plate supported on the back of a giant tortoise.' The scientist gave a superior smile and replied 'So what is the tortoise standing on?' 'You're very clever, young man, very clever', said the lady, 'but its tortoises all the way down!'

To many people, our faith seems just as absurd. Belief in God is easily characterised as something simplistic, naïve even, in contrast to the superior, sophisticated 21st century atheistic worldview, with its emphasis on scientific analysis and rational proof and no room for God or the supernatural. Leaving aside the fact that many great scientific advances in fields such as cosmology and genetics were made by Catholic priests, we should not for a moment buy into a notion that faith doesn't stand up to reasoned argument. Our appreciation of the mysteries of God is deepened by the work of many great theologians who are rightly honoured among the saints of the Church, from St Paul, St Augustine, St Thomas Aquinas, right up to those in our own time such as St John Paul II. But the mysteries of God are something that ultimately cannot be accessed by learning alone.

We are invited not merely to know God, but to fall in love with him, responding in kind to the love he has lavished upon us. Any child knows instinctively how to respond to the love of their parents. Perhaps that why children also have a great capacity to know and love God, even if they cannot yet put their faith into words. And children also have a great curiosity about the world, always asking questions. A childlike faith is not necessarily a simplistic or naïve one. As we grow older, we tend perhaps to over complicate things, and we often focus on the wrong things.

Today's gospel prompts us to reconsider our preoccupations with comfort and independence. Jesus invites us to find rest in him, and promises a yoke that is easy. A yoke is something that suggests heavy labour and perhaps even slavery. We understand from lasts week's gospel that the yoke of Christ is the cross. But it is his cross, not ours alone. He bears it with us, for us, lightening our load but also revealing to us that love is the true meaning of our existence. Love which involves overcoming the gravitational pull of our self-fulfilment, our comfort and independence. If we follow Christ, walk with him, and bear whatever crosses come our way gladly in union with him, then we will find fulfilment and joy beyond measure, because this is the very meaning of our existence, made out of love, made for love. If we go in the opposite direction, resisting Christ's call, then life will indeed be far more difficult, less rewarding. If all our energies are devoted to seeking worldly success and pleasure then we will end up exhausted and disappointed.

True peace lies in the proper ordering of everything according to God's perfect will, trusting that God's will is for our ultimate good. The rest Christ offers is not simply a permanent state of relaxation, which we all surely grow bored of eventually, but something far better than we can possibly imagine. The rest of a child in the tender embrace of its parents. The rest of a spouse enjoying the closeness of their beloved. The rest of contemplating for eternity the one who is beauty, truth and goodness himself. We need to rest in the Lord and not in ourselves - as St Augustine memorably put it, our hearts are restless until they find rest in him.
