PARISH NEWSLETTER 6TH / 7TH JANUARY 2023 THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD (B) - Mass Book Pg 49

(Isaiah 6:1-6, Ephesians 3:2-3.5-6, Matthew 2:1-12)

At Christmas we celebrate the birth of our saviour, an event known only to a small group: the holy family, the shepherds, the inn keeper. As Christmastide draws to an end, we celebrate the revealing of Christ as saviour of the world and Son of God. This Sunday we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany: the name means 'revealing' or 'showing'. Christ is shown to be the saviour of the whole world by the arrival of the wise men who have journeyed from distant lands. Their journey to Bethlehem is aided both by their study of the universe and by the scriptures given to the first people God had chosen to reveal himself to: showing that human reason and revelation are both necessary if we are to encounter God. Their journey ends with them not only presenting their gifts, but also kneeling in worship, acknowledging him as Lord and God. The gifts themselves are filled with prophetic meaning. Gold for a king: though this child who is the king of kings will not wear an earthly crown or sit on an earthly throne. He is the servant king who will wear a crown of thorns, but we pray daily for the coming of his kingdom when all things will be brought under his good and peaceful rule. Incense for worship: given to the one who is not only the great high priest who will offer perfect worship to the father, but who is himself rightly honoured as God. Myrrh, a sign of death: though the women who go to anoint his body in the tomb find it empty since the one destined to die for the sins of the world will also rise victorious from the dead.

The feast of the Epiphany occurs at the start of a new civil year, and this coincidence is reflected in two customs associated with today. Firstly, the proclamation of the date of Easter and the moveable feasts of the year, following the gospel. The practical purpose this might have once served is less relevant with the ease with which we can find these dates online or in paper diaries. Nevertheless, along with the symbolic gifts of the Magi, this proclamation reminds us that the Easter mysteries are truly the centre around which the whole year, and the whole of our lives, revolve. Another custom, centuries-old though associated more with northern and eastern Europe, is the use of blessed chalk to inscribe the initials of the Magi and the numerals of the year above the doors of our homes. It is a way of seeking God's blessing (the initials also stand for 'Christ bless this house' in Latin) and consecrating our homes as places of hospitality and love. It is also a visible sign of our faith, a witness to others and a daily reminder to ourselves as we pass under the inscription. Chalk will be

blessed and made available for this purpose (along with instructions) at this weekend's Masses.

The visit of the Magi which we chiefly associate with the feast of the Epiphany is not in fact the only 'epiphany' or 'showing' of Christ. Christmastide officially concludes with the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which we celebrate on Monday of this week: commemorating an event some thirty years later when Jesus is revealed to the crowd as the beloved Son of the Father, one with Father the Holy Spirit in his saving mission. As we ease back into Ordinary Time for the weeks between Christmas and Lent we will encounter Christ at the beginning of his adult ministry, manifesting his divine power in ways which point to his true purpose: reconciling wayward humanity to communion with God. At the beginning of a new year, let us resolve to serve God ever more faithfully, seeking his will in all things and trusting that our true and lasting good is to be found in friendship with the one who came to share his life with us.
