PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD (B) - Mass Book Pg 88

(Isaiah 50:4-7, Phillipians 2:6-11, Mark 14:1-15:47)

As anyone familiar with Upminster knows, our town is centred on a cross-road. To go on any journey through Upminster, it is necessary to go through the cross. This is a good symbol for Holy Week. Next week we celebrate Easter, the great feast of Christ's resurrection, but there is only one way to get there: through the cross. It is also a good metaphor for life - and this is why Good Friday particularly resonates with so many people. There is no such thing as a life without any pain whatsoever, and we can either give up, bury our head in the sand, despair of ever finding meaning in life, look for ways of anaesthetising the pain; or we can place



our trust in Jesus Christ, journey through the cross, all the way to the everlasting joy of his kingdom.

Today, Palm Sunday, we begin the week of high drama we call Holy Week. We commemorate our Lord's entry into Jerusalem, hailed by the crowds as the Messiah as he boldly presents himself as the one foretold by the prophets as Israel's saviour. But as we hear the account of his suffering and death, we understand that this salvation was to be accomplished at extraordinary cost. He is rejected by his own people and abandoned by those who had followed him, yet we know that this is not a defeat but a victory, whose full power is manifested in his self-offering and vindicated by his resurrection.

There is no better way to prepare for Easter than to enter as fully as possible into the celebrations of Holy Week. The distinctive liturgies of Holy Week allow us to journey with Jesus through the cross, as it were in 'real time'. We do not so much as hear the story again, as enter into it, so as to be changed. We do not stand still: there is a sense of movement, reflect in the various processions that are symbolically reenacted in the liturgy: the entry into Jerusalem, the procession to the garden of Gethsemane to watch with Our Lord, the procession to the cross, and finally the procession in which we are led by a pillar of fire like the Israelites in the desert to the freedom of the promised land represented by the baptismal font and the triumphant celebration of the first Mass of Easter.

Here is a little more background to the principal celebrations of the three days we call the Sacred Triduum – three days centred on the sacrifice of the cross in which Our Lord becomes the Passover of the new covenant to accomplish our freedom from slavery to sin and death. We begin on Holy or Maundy Thursday with the Mass of the Lord's Supper at 8pm. (NB there is no morning Mass on this day). We recall the new commandment given by our Lord, to 'love one another as I have loved you' as the celebrant, imitating the action of Christ in whose person he acts, washes the feet of those he is called to serve. At this Mass we give thanks for the institution of the Eucharist as the means by which Christ's sacrifice is continually made present for us. The Mass concludes with the transfer of the Blessed Sacrament to the Altar of Repose. This procession recalls Jesus' journey to the Garden of Gethsemane, and like the disciples we are invited to watch and pray with Jesus for a while (hopefully staying awake!). Even if you are unable to attend the Mass, you are encouraged to visit our Lord at the Altar of Repose later in the evening and spend some time with him in prayer. This vigil of prayer concludes with Night Prayer at midnight.

On **Good Friday** we commemorate the day of our Lord's crucifixion. The solemn **Liturgy of the Passion** takes place at **3pm**. This is not a Mass, but communion is distributed from the sacrament reserved following the previous night's Mass of the Lord's Supper. This ancient liturgy includes the reading of the Passion from John's Gospel, prayers of intercession for the whole world, and the veneration of the cross, when we honour the wood on which our saviour hung and worship him who died for our salvation. This is both a collective and individual act; we are invited to approach the cross as individual sinners, saddened by the knowledge of

the suffering caused by our sins, but also giving thanks for the love that is so powerfully demonstrated. Traditionally the cross is venerated with a kiss but it is acceptable to make some other gesture if you prefer. The tabernacle is empty today, but it is customary to genuflect before the crucifix after its unveiling at the solemn liturgy. If you cannot attend the afternoon liturgy, or if you would like to begin or end the day with a further time of prayer, you are invited to join in praying the Divine Office at 8.15am, and/or the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary at 7.30pm. Children and families (as well as people of all ages) are invited to take part in the Stations of the Cross at 9am. This is followed by the Churches Together Walk of Witness, starting at 10am in front of our church (see notice below – the walk will be slightly different this year).

Holy Saturday (despite the popular way of referring to the holiday weekend, 'Easter Saturday' is actually the Saturday after Easter) is a day of emptiness and preparation until the evening when we celebrate the great Easter Vigil, the highpoint of the liturgical year. This takes place after nightfall at 8pm (NB there is no 6.30pm Mass or holy hour, though I will be available for confessions at the usual time). We begin outside, weather permitting, with the blessing of a new fire from which a new Paschal Candle is lit symbolising the light of Christ. Lent is over, Easter has begun. The celebrant sings the praises of God, honouring the candle as a symbol of the resurrection. We then hear a number of readings from the Old Testament and New Testament culminating in the Gospel. Recalling the link between Easter and the sacrament of rebirth, the font is blessed and on this most holy night the newest members of Christ's church are joined to him in the sacraments of initiation before we all renew our baptismal promises. In the Liturgy of the Eucharist, as at every Mass, the entire Paschal Mystery is commemorated and the risen Christ, our victorious Passover lamb, comes among us to give us life and feed us

At this most sacred time, do please keep silence when leaving and arriving for these liturgies. We should also try and keep, as far as we can, a spirit of recollection at other times during the week, aided by the fasting and abstinence customary on Good Friday. May this be a very holy week indeed and may we thus journey through the cross to reach the glorious celebration of Christ's victory over death.

EASTER SACRAMENTS OF INITIATION: Please pray for Alex, who is to be received into the full communion of the Catholic church, and Roxanne, Autumn, Mylah, Sandra, Max and Mya who are to be baptised at the Easter Vigil.

CHRISM MASS: On Wednesday, priests of the diocese gather in the Cathedral in Brentwood for the Mass of Chrism: the annual renewal of our commitment to priestly service and the occasion when the three holy oils (of catechumens, used in baptism; of the sick; and the sacred chrism, used in baptism, confirmation and ordination) are consecrated. Please pray for the priests of the diocese on this day - you are welcome to attend this Mass which begins at 11am. There is no holy hour this Wednesday lunchtime.

RECONCILIATION SERVICE: To prepare for the celebration of Easter there will be a reconciliation service here on Tuesday 26th March starting 7.30pm with a time of penitential reflection and an opportunity for individual confession with visiting priests

HOLY WEEK TALK: On Wednesday evening from 8-9pm, there will be a short talk introducing the liturgies of the Sacred Triduum, following by a period of eucharistic adoration and the opportunity for confessions.

HOLY WEEK POSTERS: Please take one of the Holy Week posters, which are produced each year nationally by the Knights of St Columba, and display it prominently as a witness to the importance of this great week.

SERVERS: Do please come and serve for any and all of the Holy Week liturgies, and aim to arrive in the sacristy in good time to be briefed.

WALK OF WITNESS: This year Churches Together in Upminster are organising the Good Friday Walk of Witness in a different way. Instead of a single procession, which has proved difficult to obtain permission for, we are going to process in groups from the four points of the compass (or arms of the cross), converging on Upminster Park for the service or Trinity URC if it is wet or too muddy (as is looking quite likely at the moment). We, together with the people of St Laurence's. have been asked to begin in front of St Joseph's Church at 10am.

THE CWL LUNCH CLUB: We will be closed on 27th, March for Holy week and will be open as normal on 3rd April. Wishing you all a blessed and peaceful Easter.

GIFT AID NEWS: Our Gift Aid organiser Kevin Armstrong is stepping down at the end of this financial year, and we thank him for carrying out this work in service of the parish. It will be taken over by Rachel Hayward, our parish secretary and finance officer. Boxes of envelopes for the coming financial year (beginning the weekend of 6th/7th April) will be available for collection in church from Easter weekend.
