PARISH NEWSLETTER 6TH / 7TH APRIL 2024 SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER (B) - Mass Book Pg 132

(Acts 4:32-35, 1 John 5:1-6, John 20:19-31)

A week after the resurrection of Our Lord, we are with the apostles in the Upper Room once more, and the Risen Lord appears to them again. This time Thomas is with them, having been missing on the evening of Easter day. His scepticism is not unreasonable. People generally don't rise from the dead. He understands that this doesn't mean much if it's just a spiritual phenomenon, Jesus appearing as if a ghost. He needs to be able to see and touch to be convinced. A human person is, after all, a unity of body and soul, so for the resurrection to be real, it needs to involve the body as well as the soul. The tomb needs to be empty; the risen one appearing to the disciples needs to be physically present, even if his glorified post-resurrection body also transcends the limitations of the material world. Thomas also understands that no mere mortal could have power over death like this; only one who is true man can die, only one who is true God can rise from the dead. As soon as he sees Jesus in the flesh and his doubts are removed, he acclaims 'My Lord and my God'. Doubt leads to profound faith.

This Sunday has a number of names. It is the Octave Day of Easter, the conclusion of the 'week of Sundays' that flows from Easter Day celebrating the joy of the resurrection at a greater intensity than we can sustain for the whole 50 days of Easter. It is Low Sunday, reflecting its lesser status in comparison to the greatest day of the year, though of course every Sunday throughout the year is a commemoration of the resurrection; that is why Sunday (not Saturday, the Sabbath) is for us the Lord's Day, the day of rest and worship. It is 'White Sunday' or 'Dominica in Albis', from a tradition that the newly baptised would take off the baptismal garment they have worn since Easter day. It is also known as Quasimodo Sunday, from the entrance antiphon 'Like (*Quasimodo*) new born infants' – the character in Victor Hugo's novel is so named as he was found abandoned on this day.

There is another name, Divine Mercy Sunday, since this Sunday was instituted as such by Pope St John Paul II in 2000, when he also canonised St Faustina, the Polish nun who had received a vision of Our Lord in which he requested renewed devotion to this mystery. Unlike most new feasts, there was no need for a new set of

prayers and readings. Indeed, it is most unusual for a new feast to be established on a Sunday. But it fits very naturally with what is already celebrated this Sunday. We look back at the events of Good Friday through the lens of Easter – Our Lord appears with his wounds still visible as a permanent reminder of his love – and recognise the entire Paschal Mystery as the ultimate expression of God's love and tender mercy. The Divine Mercy image shows rays of red and white light coming from Our Lord's heart, calling to mind the blood and water that flowed from his pierced side and signifying the sacraments of baptism and the eucharist, inextricably linked to his gift of himself on the cross and the means of sharing in his risen life.

In his resurrection appearances the Lord does not scold the disciples for abandoning him, but simply declares 'Peace' – the peace he brings is not a peace belonging to this world, a short-lived absence of conflict, but a much deeper and lasting peace that comes from everything being ordered to the perfect will of God, a peace that becomes possible now that humanity has been reconciled to him. And he bestows an advance gift of the Holy Spirit specifically for the forgiveness of sins, so that the apostles and their successors can make his mercy and his peace a reality in the life of the church, through the sacrament of reconciliation. Let us give thanks for all these things today, and in giving thanks open our hearts to receive these gifts more completely.

Finally, I would like to reiterate my personal thanks to all those who contributed to such a marvellous celebration of the Easter Triduum, whether visible or behind the scenes (in last week's newsletter I neglected to mention the Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, who not only assisted in the liturgies but also take communion to the sick at home). I would also like to thank you all for your generous cards, gifts and contributions to the Easter offering, which are all very much appreciated, as are your continued prayers.
