FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER (C) - Mass Book Pg 262

(Acts 13:14, 43b-52, Revelation7:9,13a, 14b-17, John 10:27-30)

At this point in Eastertide we move away from the post -resurrection gospels and contemplate earlier teaching in the light of the Resurrection. On the fourth Sunday of Easter we always hear a passage from the Good Shepherd discourse in John's gospel. It's resonance with Easter is clear: the best-known verse (which we hear in Year B) is perhaps the one in which Jesus declares 'the good shepherd lays down his life for his sheep' (John 10.11). In the shorter passage given to



us today, when Jesus returns to the theme a little later, he tells his listeners 'I give them eternal life, and they will never perish' – the shepherd lays down his life precisely to give us life without end.

Alongside this Easter emphasis on eternal life, today's passage highlights a particular connection between the shepherd and his flock – his voice, which the sheep hear, and respond to, because the shepherd knows the sheep and the sheep known and trust the shepherd. Good Shepherd Sunday is the Day of Prayer for Vocations – with vocations to the priesthood and religious life especially in mind. The link between priestly ministry and shepherding is apparent in the word 'pastor' (which means shepherd). We recall the instruction Jesus gave Peter at their breakfast meeting on the shore of the sea of Galilee: feed my sheep. From Pope to parish priest, we are ordained to be shepherds of Christ's flock. Shepherding includes the sacramental ministry which is the *raison d'etre* for the priest's existence: feeding the sheep with the food of eternal life, and making Christ's gift of himself a present reality.

The word 'vocation' is linked to the word 'voice'. In order to be an effective shepherd after the pattern of the Good Shepherd, the priest must listen to that voice, and respond with generosity: not just hearing and heeding the

call to ordination, but in every moment. And that is true of all of us, whatever our particular calling in the world and in the church, as followers of Christ joined to him in holy baptism. To be able to hear his voice, we must be close to him in prayer. For the voice of the shepherd is easily crowded out by other noise. What, in particular, is asked of us this Sunday? As the cards produced by our diocesan vocation office remind us, Our Lord himself tells us to pray, that God may give us the priests we need. We should take this task seriously: making it a specific intention for our prayers. Asking God for something is, however, never merely passive. We pray, so that we may be more fully aligned to God's will. In praying for more priests we also seek greater generosity on our own part in responding to God's will, after the example of our mother Mary. We pray for a greater awareness of the centrality of the sacraments in the life of the church, like those martyrs of the reformation period who were ready to give their lives (as priests and laypeople) to ensure the flame of faith would not die out in this land. We pray that our own lives may be a good example of courageous selflessness that may inspire those around us to ask 'what does God want of me?' rather that 'what do I want to be?'. And please pray for your priests, and the bishops of the church – including our new Pope – that they may always hear that voice.

Another detail from today's gospel. Israel had long seen God as a shepherd figure: an image expressed in the psalms and prophets. In identifying himself as the Good Shepherd Jesus is therefore making a bold claim, not only that he is the promised successor to the shepherd-king David, but that he is truly God, tending to his flock. To underscore the point, he states, 'I and the Father are one'. This was not missed by his listeners, who immediately after this take up stones to throw at him. In the light of Easter, we understand that our task above all is to proclaim Jesus Christ, crucified and risen, to be Our Lord and God, to follow him, and identify ourselves without hesitation as his, that others may come to hear his voice and receive his gift of life.

This Sunday is Good Shepherd Sunday, or the World Day of Prayer for Vocations. Please pray for vocations to the priesthood for our diocese and for those currently training for the priesthood. The second collection supports the education and formation of our seminarians.

This will be on Tuesday 1st July.

MARRIAGE MASS: Bishop Alan will be celebrating the annual Mass of Thanksgiving for Marriage and Family Life in Brentwood Cathedral on Saturday 21st June. If you are celebrating a significant wedding anniversary this year and would like to receive an invitation to this Mass please contact the parish office.
