TWENTY-SIXTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR (C) - Mass Book Pg 143

(Amos 6:1a,4-7, 1 Timothy 6:11-16, Luke 16:19-31)

Week by week we profess our faith in God as the 'maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible'. On Monday of this week we celebrate the feast of the archangels Saints Michael, Gabriel and Raphael – sometimes called 'Michaelmas'.

Angels are easily misunderstood. We might be sceptical of them, viewing them as a sort of religious version of fairies. For some people they are in the same category as



crystals and other 'new age' spiritual fads – something to hold on to whilst rejecting the central claims of Christian belief, or something to be derisively dismissive of. Yet the bible reminds us that creation is not limited to what we can see, and those beings we call 'angels' are very much part of that unseen creation. Angels are mighty spiritual beings (that is to say, without material bodies), who – like us – are created to glorify and serve God and share in the joy which he desires for all his creatures.

God rarely reveals himself directly to us; very often when God wants to communicate directly to a human person he does so through an angelic intermediary. The most notable example is at the Annunciation, when the Archangel Gabriel tells Mary what God wishes to do through her, and receives her answer. This event -the beginning of the incarnation, when the Son of God shares our human nature in order to redeem it and restore our communion with God – is commemorated daily in the devotion known as the Angelus. We recite this at the beginning of our weekday Mass, and the tower bell (named 'Gabriel' when it was blessed last year) additionally chimes the pattern associated with the angelus at noon and 6pm. If you are unfamiliar with this prayer, you might like to take one of the prayer cards which I have had re-printed.

At the end of our daily Mass we typically say the prayer to St Michael, which you will find on the other side of those prayer cards. It was composed by Pope Leo

XIII towards the end of the 19th century and used after low Mass throughout the church, initially for the intention of preserving the independence of the Holy See from temporal threats, and then from 1929 for the freedom of Russia from communist atheistic ideology. This ended as a universal practice in the 1960s. Nevertheless Pope St John Paul II encouraged its use: "I ask everyone not to forget [this prayer] and to recite it to obtain help in the battle against the forces of darkness and against the spirit of this world". The use of this prayer as an additional devotion at the end of Mass struck me as a fitting response to the invasion of Ukraine, as well the increasing attacks on the dignity of human life in the modern world, attacks which amount to a fundamental rejection of God and his will for humanity. This prayer recognises that the angels posses free will like us, but their closeness to God gives their choice a more definitive character than most of our choices, and more serious consequences for themselves and for creation. The evil one we refer to as the devil or Satan is an angel created by God who chose not to serve God and instead set upon doing all in his power to thwart God's will. That power is considerable, but in no way a match for the Almighty. By invoking St Michael, the leader of the heavenly armies, and placing ourselves under his protection, we recognise that we are caught up in something bigger than ourselves, bigger even than the world we see, and declare that our choice is for the side of light rather than darkness.

SCHOOL FORMS: Fr Matthew will be issuing Certificates of Catholic Practice for those applying for Catholic <u>Secondary</u> Schools at the following times. **Tuesday 7**th **October 5pm-7pm and Thursday 9**th **October 4pm-6pm.** Letters for other schools with a church attendance requirement will be issued at the same time. The Certificate is for those who attend Mass weekly. If you don't qualify for a Certificate of Catholic Practice, you don't need to come along, but it is still worth applying to the school with just a baptism certificate. Baptism certificates must be obtained from the parish where baptism took place. No appointment needed, and you don't need to bring anything with you – just come to the church (there may be a queue).

BECOMING A CATHOLIC? If you are thinking about joining the Catholic church, whether baptised in another church, never baptised, or even a baptised Catholic who missed out on first communion/confirmation, Fr Matthew will explain the process after all Mass on 11th/12th October.
